

#### **Rushton Hurley: *The Stories that Inspire Educators to Reach All Learners***

Rushton Hurley has worked and studied on three continents as a Japanese language teacher, school principal, teacher trainer, and inspirational speaker. He founded and directs the educational nonprofit Next Vista for Learning, which houses a free library of creative educational videos at [NextVista.org](http://NextVista.org), and holds masters degrees in Education and East Asian Studies from Stanford University.

The author of three books, Rushton's fun and thoughtful talks center on inspiration and creativity, technology and leadership, avenues for engaging learning, the power of digital media and tools for collaboration, and personal and professional perspectives in a technology-infused, ever-changing world.

## ***The Stories that Inspire Educators to Reach All Learners***

We regularly hear from school leaders that they and their teams are committed to reaching all learners. Those who work with services for children with disabilities understand, however, that at many schools, the complexities of providing services can be seen as a burden on an already full list of tasks.

One of the more effective, but not often enough used, tools for helping administrators embrace and foster more inclusive strategies is the focused, shareable story. Stories of successes with students can be powerful and build support within the community for programs that inspire children who might otherwise be left behind. These stories can be done with simple and often free digital media tools, and done in a way that properly protects the privacy of all involved.

In this talk and the following workshop, we'll look at how stories in general, and educator- and student-produced stories in particular, can be part of helping more teachers and other members of the educational team improve how they serve and inspire all students.
